


Figure 1: Location of Iowa Wing Units

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This report documents the Iowa Wing History from 01 January to 31 December 2013. The Iowa Wing had a successful year that first started with a change of command ceremony and a smooth transition. The Wing supported all three Civil Air Patrol mission: Aerospace Education, Cadet Programs, and Emergency Services. While each area was overall successful for the 2013 year, there are numerous areas of improvement. Cadet Programs most notable achievements include the hosting of the Wing Encampment, awarding the Carl A. Spaatz and Ira C. Eaker awards, and the Drug Demand Reduction Program. Emergency Services continues to struggle for ground teams due to the decrease in ELT missions. However, air operations continues to thrive with successful training of new aircrews and continued tasking from multiple agencies in support of disaster relief. Aerospace Education remains to be a strong mission for the Iowa Wing due to its continued support of the Cadet Program. The Wing currently has eight subordinate squadrons. Although the size of each squadron varies considerably, the local support in all three missions is strong. The Iowa Wing will face interesting and new challenges for the 2014 year.

CHAPTER 1—INTRODUCTION

The Iowa Wing completed its 72nd year of service to the citizens of Iowa and to the United States of America. The Iowa Wing was established in December 1941 following the creation of the Civil Air Patrol under Administrative Order 9. The wing placed under the command of Major Daniel J. Hunter, CAP. Originally, the wing was organized into four groups consisting of about 3 or 4 squadrons each. However, by the end of World War II, the wing was separated into 5 groups and nearly 30 squadrons consisting of at least 50 members each and 29 detached flights. Through the war, 68 wing personnel were tasked with Coastal Patrols, in which 12 were awarded the Air Medal by the Air Force in 1948. When Coastal Patrols ended, the wing was tasked with courier service by the 2nd Air Force. Wing personnel flew service members, mail, parts, and supplies around Iowa to bases, supply depots, and ammunition plants in support of the war effort. By the end of World War II, the Iowa Wing had the largest membership in the 7th Region with over 4,000 members and 140 planes.

While the membership has diminished and the number of chartered units greatly reduced, the wing continues to provide volunteer services to the State of Iowa. Currently, the Iowa Wing is organized into a Wing Headquarters located at Camp Dodge, Johnston, IA with 8 subordinate units. There is one senior squadron, one cadet squadron, and six composite squadrons. The wing ended 2013 with 168 adult volunteers and 96 cadet volunteers.

The Iowa Wing began the 2013 year with the change of command from Colonel Ron Scheitzach to Colonel Michael Mouw. We congratulate Col Scheitzach for a good well done and wish him luck in future endeavors at North Central Region.




Figure 2: 2013 Iowa Wing Membership




Figure 3: Iowa Wing Organizational Chart *Based on the Personnel Authorization NO 13-027

WING COMMANDER: COLONEL MICHEAL MOUW, CIVIL AIR PATROL

Col Michael Mouw is the Commander of Iowa Wing, Civil Air Patrol. He assumed command on 12 January 2013. A native of Boyden, Iowa, Col Mouw first joined CAP in 1991 while on active duty with the United States Air Force. He joined the Wichita Falls Composite Squadron at Sheppard AFB, TX. In August of 1991 he became the Squadron Commander of the Wichita Falls Composite Squadron. Later Col Mouw was assigned to 114th Fighter Wing with the South Dakota Air National Guard and transferred to the Sioux Falls Composite Squadron and South Dakota Wing. He served on Wing Staff for South Dakota as the Cadet Programs Director and Emergency Services Officer. Col Mouw transferred to Iowa Wing in 2007 where he founded the Sheldon Composite Squadron in his hometown and served as the Squadron Commander. He also held the positions of Director of Operations,



Director of Professional Development, Director of Cadet Programs, and was a member of the Executive Staff for Iowa Wing. In 2009 Col Mouw relocated to Keesler AFB, MS and then on to Scott AFB, IL. He transferred to Illinois Wing and was appointed as the Commander for Group 1. In June 2012 Col Mouw relocated to Des Moines, Iowa to take a position with the Veteran Affairs Central Iowa Healthcare System as an Occupational Health and Safety Manager. At that time he was assigned as the Iowa Wing Vice Commander.

Col Mouw's achievements include a Master Rating in Cadet Programs, Professional Development, Safety, Aerospace Education, Operations, Recruiting Retention and Emergency Services and Senior Ratings in Command, Administration, and Personnel. He is a Mission and Counter Drug Master Rated Observer and Scanner, Incident Commander, Operations Section Chief, Planning Section Chief, Ground Branch Director, and Ground Team Leader. Col Mouw was selected as Cadet Programs Officer of the year for South Dakota Wing in 2006. In addition, he has held positions of Deputy Commander for Cadets, Safety Officer, Transportation Officer, and Deputy Squadron Commander. Col Mouw is an Officer with the Army Reserve where he serves as an Environmental Engineer.

Lieutenant Colonel Donald Hahn, Jr. began his service to Civil Air Patrol in September 1989 as a Senior Member in support of his son's interest in the CAP program. In 1990, Lt Col Hahn volunteered to become the Squadron Commander of the Davenport Composite Squadron. He served in this position until 1995. During his time as Squadron Commander he was also involved with the aerospace program and earned his ground team leader qualification in emergency services. As the commander, Davenport Composite Squadron earned the Unit of the Year Award. The training classes Capt Brudtkuhl developed for the Iowa Wing have been used in several wings across the USA. As IAWG DC, he oversaw the installation of new repeaters and the transition to narrow-band communications for the State of Iowa.

CHAPTER 4—COMMAND STAFF

Thoughts from the Wing Commander:

The Iowa Wing continues to operate successfully in support of the three missions: Aerospace Education, Cadet Programs, and Emergency Services. The transition from Col Scheitzach to the new Wing Command Staff was smooth and presented no major obstacles or hurdles. The last year, however, has been both a challenge and rewarding. The Wing continues to excel at the Aerospace Education mission. While both the Cadet Programs and Emergency Services were successful, a few areas require improvement. The biggest challenges that 2014 present include recruitment of cadets and senior members, retention of experienced senior members, and communication. Regrettably, the 2014 year saw the stepping-down of Major Cindi Waccholz. I look forward to the new challenges and dynamics presented in the 2014 year.

Thoughts from the Chief of Staff:

My first year as the Chief of Staff has been both interesting and challenging. Due to work demands, I have not been able to devote the time that this important position deserves. However, I am looking forward to what 2014 brings.

Our Wing Commander has some great ideas for near-term and long-term goals. To see these goals achieved (or at least progress towards) will be very rewarding. The biggest challenge is finding CAP members who are willing to step up and actively fill the vacant positions we have on the Iowa Wing Staff so that we can move the entire wing forward.

CHAPTER 5—CADET PROGRAMS

The Iowa Wing had a successful year for Cadet Programs. Cadets continue to earn milestone awards as demonstrated by the awarding of both the General Carl A. Spaatz Award and the General Ira C. Eaker Award. Most notably, the Wing hosted a successful summer encampment at Camp Dodge, Johnston, IA. Attendees included 16 senior staff, 18 cadet staff, and 30 basic cadets. While the majority were from Iowa, but attendees ranged from Minnesota, South Dakota, Colorado, Florida, Kansas, and Missouri. The 30 basic cadet attendees were divided into four flights (A through D). The encampment commander was Capt Jason Erickson and the encampment cadet commander was C/Col Adam Waccholz. Honored guests included Brigadier General Jennifer Walter, Brigadier General J. Derek Hill, and WWII/Korea Veteran Sgt Joe Boitnott. Activities for the encampment included the required encampment curriculum but also the confidence course, EST 2000 Electronic Weapons Training System, Gold Star Museum, Des Moines Astrological Society, Des Moines Modelaires (Radio Controlled Aircraft), DDR speaker by Jesse Gildea (Think First VIP), Leadership Reaction Course, and a DDR Pharmacology talk.

However, the Wing's Cadet Programs continues to struggle in a number of area. This year, Iowa only awarded a small number of Wright Brothers Award. This lack in awarding the first milestone award demonstrates a continued problem of cadet retention within the first few ranks. In addition, the Iowa Wing continues to struggle for cadet recruitment as total number of cadets remains to decrease. Even though we started the year with 95 cadets and finished with 96 cadets, the overall trend continues to decrease. The total number of cadet participants for National Cadet Special Activities has also seen a decreasing trend over the years.

At the unit level, support for the Cadet Program is strong. The Wing has hosted an annual Training Leaders of Cadets (TLC) class with support from the local squadrons. The course had 8 new attendees. Senior Member Professional Development in Cadet Programs continues with the awarding of 4 technician ratings, 2 senior ratings, and 2 master ratings. The 2014 year will bring new challenges for Squadron Cadet Program Officers.

DRUG DEMAND REDUCTION:

The Iowa Wing has been working hard to demonstrate a strong commitment to establishing a drug-free America. The DDR Program was presented to both cadets and

senior members in a variety of ways. The Wing's accomplishments included preparing activities for the Iowa Wing Conference that highlighted Red Ribbon Week. These were shoebox dioramas made by cadets and senior members, a presentation on the DDR program, and an explanation of Red Ribbon Week. Red Ribbons were distributed to attending members. Following the discussion, participants went to various activity stations for additional hands-on sessions.

Senior members and cadets attending the 2013 Iowa Wing Summer Encampment also heard the "Follow Your Dream and Stay Clean" message. Encampment DDR presentations included: IMSAFE, "ThinkFirst Iowa", and a talk from a local pharmacist. An Iowa Wing pilot gave the IMSAFE presentation. The other two speakers were local community members, which provided a great opportunity to promote the Civil Air Patrol.

The Iowa Wing Cadet DDR Program Officer completed the required forms for the DDR section of the CAP Wing Compliance Inspection/SAV in August. Also, the creation of a quick reference chart of Squadron Commanders, Cadet Program Officers, and DDR officers in the Iowa Wing made it easy to frequently send out DDR-related information (e.g. MADD, JT Daily News, NIDA) and forward information from the North Central Region DDR Officer via e-mail. Squadrons were often reminded of the importance of DDR participation and submitting the After Activity Reports. The DDR End of Year Report was completed in a timely manner and forwarded to the region DDR officer. The Iowa Wing participated in the NCR Cadet DDR Program Officer Conference Calls.

The missions of the DDR Program were being promoted in the Iowa Wing and at the squadron level. Several squadrons used exercises from the DDRx Activity Guide during their squadron meetings. The Northwest Iowa Composite Squadron currently has two cadets serving as cadet DDR assistants. In August 2013, C/1st Lt Lewandowski was credited with the discovery of a "shake and bake" meth lab while on a family fishing trip. The cadet credited the DDR training that he received at his local squadron meeting in identifying this hazard and knowing to call the police to the scene to have it disposed of properly. This real-life example showed the importance of the program's elements of education, training, and outreach that Iowa Wing is working to support.

CHAPTER 6—AEROSPACE EDUCATION

The Aerospace Education Program of the Iowa Wing is being administered by a great group of dedicated and enthusiastic volunteers. Each unit has some segments of the program in play. In 2013, National Headquarters introduced STEM Kits. These kits with lesson plans are designed to promote science, technology, engineering and math to Civil Air Patrol cadets. The purpose is to stimulate our youth into considering careers in aerospace and the STEM Disciplines. The kits are free to the units. This makes a great addition to already established programs such as AEX, Model Rocketry and the Satellite Tool Kit.

Aerospace is being done at some level in all of the units. The challenge is to have a duty assigned AE Officer in 100% of the units. Then, educate, encourage and support the implantation of the complete Aerospace Education program in each unit. This was our first full cycle year where we had 100% participation in completing end of year reporting...Fantastic! Our program is maturing as more of the program elements are being implemented.

CHAPTER 7—OPERATIONS/EMERGENCY SERVICES

The Wing's operational missions continue to decrease due to the deactivation of the 121.5 mHz SARSATs. The entire year reported a single ELT mission and a single Counterdrug mission. As a result, the wing struggles with ground sorties and qualification of ground team and UDF members. We continue to train and maintain aircrew certifications throughout the wing, though.

Our operations include tasking by both State and Federal agencies. In May 2013, the Iowa Wing was tasked by FEMA to fly photography missions in support of state-wide flooding. The Wing supported the mission with three aircraft flying a total of 31.8 hours. In June, the State EOC tasked the Iowa Wing to fly a photography mission of the Waspie River. As a response, the wing provided a single aircrew and flew 3.8 hours. July reported the only 121.5 mHz mission, which the Iowa Wing responded to a 121.5 mHz ELT near Grinnell, Iowa. In support of this mission, the Wing provided two hours of aircrew time and 7.7 man-hours of ground team time. The ELT was located and the wing was accredited with a single ELT find. Our only counterdrug mission was provided during the month of August. The Iowa Wing flew 3.7 hours in support of illegal narcotics. The year ended with a tasking by the Department of Corrections to fly a photography mission. The wing provided a single aircrew.

The Iowa Wing continues to support the cadet programs by providing aircraft and aircrews for several national flight academies. During the summer months, three aircraft were offered. As a response, the Wing provided a total of 465 man-hours and 112.4 hours of flight time. Furthermore, the Iowa Wing continued to support the Cadet Orientation Ride Program. Overall, 126 O-flights were given to cadets, which equaled 86.3 hours.

During the 2013 year, the Iowa Wing reported 31 qualified pilots, which flew 549.5 hours. However, the total flight time for the wing was 651.1 hours. The difference in numbers is due to the Wing's aircraft being flown by non-Iowa Wing members at the national flight academies. With its single glider, the wing provided 83 glider flights. The Iowa Wing ended the year with 11 mission pilots, 5 single engine aircraft, 1 glider, and 14 vehicles.

Iowa Wing continues with its strong commitment to the Communications Program. The Wing has 9 repeater stations located throughout the state. These include Marion, Waterloo, Audubon, Des Moines, Mount Joy (Quad Cities), Sac City, Burlington, Dubuque, and Mason City.

CHAPTER 10—FINANCE

The Iowa Wing's financial status is strong, though careful monitoring is needed to ensure continued strength. For FY 13, the Wing operated under a combined budget of approximately \$48,000. The fiscal year ended 30 September 2013 with a positive balance. The Iowa Wing faced two challenges during the 2013 FY. First, was the abrupt closure of the Fort Des Moines museum, which forced us to relocate wing headquarters to Camp Dodge in spring 2013. This also resulted in a financial hit to the wing, as we had prepaid our rent for the year. The second challenge was, and continues to be, timing our expense payments with reimbursements from national headquarters. On a somewhat positive note, the Wing did receive a \$10,000 bequest from the estate of a deceased member. However, the terms of bequest prevent us from presently using the amount. The Wing continues to seek out additional funding opportunities, such as external grants and fundraising.

CHAPTER 11—LOGISTICS

The Iowa Wing continues to do an outstanding job of meeting the required deadlines for nationally directed reports. For the occasional lost or destroyed item, we are learning and improving at processing the Reports of Survey (ROS) in a timely manner.

With recent changes from National, which opened the doorway for a more expeditious way of disposing old equipment, we will be able to clear a lot of outdated equipment from our quartermaster.

The biggest problem we faced this past year, and will continue to see for some time, was the lack of availability of uniform clothing. We have nearly exhausted all of our supply except for some of the most common larger sizes. It has become nearly impossible to find uniform items in small sizes. However, we will continue to search out alternative sources for these items, as we can no longer get them through the Defense Reutilization and Marketing Office (DRMO).

Civil Air Patrol Family Fishing Trip Hooks a DDR Discovery

Ft. Dodge, Iowa. The Civil Air Patrol's Drug Demand Reduction Program (DDR) focuses on drug abuse awareness, education and prevention. The training received at the Northwest Iowa Composite Squadron (NWICS), in Ft. Dodge, Iowa, led Cadet 1st Lieutenant (C/1Lt) Jacob Lewandowski to accurately identify and report a "shake and bake" meth lab. As with many larger communities, drug abuse is not uncommon, and homemade meth labs are easy enough to create. Most would look like discarded trash, which is also not uncommon along a river bank. On 26 July 2013, the Lewandowski family was fishing at the old Hydro-Electric Dam near their home in Ft. Dodge. "I almost dismissed the objects as nothing more than common litter, "stated C/1Lt Lewandowski, "then I remembered a presentation given to my Civil Air Patrol squadron about common drugs in our area. I immediately told my mother that I thought I had discovered- a "shake and bake" meth lab."

Captain Roger Porter, from the Fort Dodge Police Department- Narcotics Division, had visited the NWICS in 2012 and presented many examples and illustrations of the drug problem in Iowa. That presentation was part of the DDR program coordinated by Capt Jan Lewandowski, the Iowa Wing and NWICS's Drug Demand Reduction Officer. "This is a perfect example of how important the DDR Program is in our squadrons and in our communities," said Capt Lewandowski, "we were able to take the necessary steps to have this potential hazard removed not only from our family, but also anyone who may have stumbled across it in the future." Immediately after the discovery, the Ft. Dodge Police Department was called and Officer Jody Chansler arrived to the scene. "It was indeed a meth lab and was most likely less than 24 hours old," stated Officer Chansler. The officer then took the time to explain each part of the evidence to both Cadet Lewandowski and his brother, Luke, also a cadet in the NWICS. "We were both very happy to learn as much as we could not only for ourselves, but also because of our roles as Cadet DDR Officer Assistants in our squadron," stated C/1Lt Lewandowski. The Civil Air Patrol Drug Demand Reduction Program assists units at all levels to instill an aggressive, positive, drug-free attitude in CAP members, Air Force families, Department of Defense, civilians and school-age children through a comprehensive program. The DDR Program promotes CAP as a positive community service lifestyle, encourages youth to remain in school, focuses on drug abuse awareness, education and prevention and provides positive activities as an alternative to drugs and gang violence. Civil Air Patrol, the official auxiliary of the U.S. Air Force, is a nonprofit organization with more than 61,000 members nationwide, operating a fleet of 550 aircraft. CAP, in its Air Force auxiliary role, performs 90 percent of continental U.S. inland search and rescue missions as tasked by the Air Force Rescue Coordination Center and is credited by the AFRCC with saving an average of 80 lives annually. Its volunteers also perform homeland security, disaster relief and drug interdiction missions at the request of federal, state and local agencies. The members play a leading role in aerospace education and serve as mentors to nearly 27,000 young people currently participating in the CAP cadet programs. CAP received the World Peace Prize in 2011 and has been performing missions for America for 71 years. 

Heraldry:

The dark blue represents the affiliation with the USAF. The hawk represents the state's nickname: The Hawkeye State. This nickname was chosen as a tribute to Indian leader Chief Black Hawk. The ear of corn represents the state as "The Corn State". The hawk is reversed since the patch was designed to be worn on the right shoulder (1945). When the CAP emblem was removed from the left shoulder and wing patches moved to the left shoulder, the hawk was never reversed. The shape of the hawk's wings (a V-shape) is to represent "Victory".
